Toledo Man Tracks Down Father He Thought Had Died in Vietnam War<

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) Gary Warstler's father has returned from the dead.

For years, Warstler searched for his father, George, even though the Army said he had been killed during the Vietnam War. Warstler said he never fully believed the Army's report because his father last was seen in Australia in 1969.

Last year, the Pentagon said that it was wrong and had found George Warstler, 48, in New Zealand. His son visited there last year and said his father, a Toledo native, was eager to return to the United States.

George Warstler faces an embezzlement charge under another name in New Zealand and the Pentagon says he is a deserter, but his son said that does not matter.

"He cannot wait to see his grandkids," said Gary Warstler, who has two sons. "He's coming back as soon as he can."

"If you would have asked me three years ago if there was any hope (that his father was still alive), I would have said no," the younger Warstler added. "But I stared at him for 10 days

when I went there."

This week, the NBC television program "Dateline" will broadcast a story on Gary Warstler's search for his father and their reunion.

The series of events leading to that meeting began when a man identified as David Mitchell was charged with embezzlement in New Zealand and his fingerprints were entered in a computer.

The Pentagon told New Zealand authorities that the fingerprints matched those of George Warstler, a former Army sergeant who first was listed as absent without leave, then as a deserter and finally as administratively dead.

The military had been making death benefit payments to Warstler's wife, Gisela, since he was declared dead in 1981. The Pentagon notified the family last year that Warstler had been found and stopped the payments.

Gary Warstler telephoned his father in February 1994 and visited him in November.

The Army intends to arrest the elder Warstler for desertion. But an Army spokeswoman, Maj. Bonnie Herbert, said no one knows what will happen after his arrest.

"This is a precedent-setting case. This whole circumstance has never happened before," she said.

Mrs. Warstler, who never remarried, said she never felt certain her husband was killed.

"If you don't have a body, let me tell you, the thought (that he might be alive) never leaves you," she said.

Gary Warstler's visit to New Zealand helped him fill in some big blanks. After serving in Vietnam, George Warstler was assigned to duty in the United States in 1969. During a leave in Australia, he learned his former platoon had been wiped out.

Warstler was a frequent user of alcohol and drugs at the time and the news sent him "over the edge," his son said. "He said he just went crazy. He lost all sense of reality."

George Warstler obtained fake identification in Australia and dropped out of society for several years, his son added. He later moved to New Zealand, where he eventually got a job collecting parking meter coins.
